We regret to announce that our former Bishop, Reverend Jiho Machida passed away on March 5. Bishop Machida served many years at Soto Mission of Hawaii supporting its community.

He was especially well educated and helped translate many teachings, books, and tradition from Japanese style to Hawaii(an) style that we practice today and without his understanding and contribution, Soto Mission in Hawaii would not have been able to adapt to the local community as it serves today.

We would like to take this moment to express our gratitude to Bishop Jiho Machida for the many years he served the community of Hawaii in sharing the Dharma and Wisdom.



From the bottom of our hearts, Bishop Shugen Komagata, Board of Directors, temple ministers and staff, and members and supporters of Soto Mission of Hawaii, express our deepest condolences to Mrs. Violet Machida and the family.

Mother's Day and Buddha Day Service (May 14)

We will be celebrating Mother's Day and Buddha Day, Buddha's Birthday Service on May 14. Buddha Day is held to commemorate the birth of Siddartha Gautama in Lumbini Garden. During the service, a flower shrine known as hanamido, is set up front of the main altar as a symbol of Lumbini Garden. In this shrine is placed a statuette of the infant Buddha, pointing his right hand toward the heavens and his left hand towards the earth. The Sangha offers flowers and pours sweet tea over the image. Kambutsu is the rite of 'bathing the body of the Buddha.' This simplified reenactment of the Buddha's birth signifies glory and joy that filled the world at this event.

We will be decorating the Hanamido or the Flower Altar on Saturday, May 13. We are looking for flower donations and volunteer workers to decorate the altar. If you are able to, please call the temple to let us know that you will be available to help or to drop off the flowers. Flower donation will be accepted the day before (Friday, May 12, 8 AM to 4 PM).

Please join us in sharing our appreciation to our Mothers and also celebrate the Birth of Shakyamuni Buddha, our founder at the service on

33 Kannon Osunafumi Service (June 4)

Once again this year, we will be observice the 33 Kannon Osunafumi Service. On June 4, we will be having our 33 Kannon Osunafumi Service. This service is a special service where we bring down the 33 Kannon Bodhisattvas that are enshrined on the altar. These



Kannon Bodhisattvas are a replica of the 33 Kannon Bodhisattvas of the pilgrimage temples in Western Japan.

This service is composed of two words, first word is Osuna or Suna, meaning sand and second word is Fumi, meaning to step on. Together Osunafumi means stepping on the sand, symbolizing pilgrimage. Many years ago, ministers/ jizoku/ members of our temples journeyed through the actual pilgrimage in Japan and collected the sands from each of these temples and brought them back to Hawaii. Today we are fortunate to experience and practice the pilgrimage of going to the 33 temples here in Hawaii through the efforts made by our pioneer members. Not to mention that this is the only time we bring down the 33 Kannon Bodhisattvas from the altar and for the public to come and see them closely.

Many people still to this day journey through the pilgrimage in Japan to pray for their loved one's well-being. Please come by for your journey at our temple to pray and wish to the all compassionate Kannon Bodhisattvas.

Soto Mission of Hawaii Heavily Affected by Recent Rainstorms

February 2023 was a month of much needed rainfall throughout the islands. At the Soto Mission of Hawaii, though, the heavy rain had damaging effects. On February 19, several pieces of concrete roofing material along the fascia (roof trim) of the Komagata Hall popped off and dropped two stories on to the driveway below.

Of immediate concern was ensuring the safety of the students and faculty of the Soto Academy, an elementary school in the Komagata Hall. Overhead protection was quickly constructed, and safety barriers were placed in potentially hazardous areas. This would allow students to finish out the school year in person. During the very thorough examination of the Komagata Hall, a laundry list of other problems began to reveal itself—a never-before-replaced roof over fifty years old, more spalling around the building and in stairwells, rusting railings, hidden drainage problems, and cracked sidewalks.

This comes at a time when the Soto Mission of Hawaii is already dealing with extensive repairs in the temple building. In fact, the walls of the temple restrooms currently under renovation sustained water damage on the same day the Komagata Hall spalling incident occurred. This has reinforced the need for timely repairs to be done on the temple roof as well.

Remedial construction on the Komagata Hall will begin in June 2023 and is estimated to continue to the end of year, if not longer. Due to the extended duration of repairs, it has already been determined that the Soto Mission of Hawaii will not have a Bon Dance in August 2023. For years, the Bon Dance had been one of the temple's main annual gatherings and fundraising events. This year will be the fourth year in a row (Bon Dance was canceled in 2020, 2021, and 2022 due to Covid-19) that there will not be a Bon Dance in Nuuanu.

The Soto Academy is also devastated. In May 2022, after years of low enrollment and rising operational costs, parents were notified that this school year would be its last. They quickly rallied to form a new school entity and were in negotiations for a new lease on the Komagata Hall when the spalling began. And so, it was with a heavy heart that on March 2, the Soto Mission of Hawaii notified the new administration that it would not be able to further negotiations on a lease since the much-needed repairs would continue well into the next school year. Since then, the parents and leaders of the Soto Academy have been working hard to find a new home for their students. They have held sign waving events and even asked a local news station to share their story to increase awareness and ask the public for help in finding a new home.

The repairs on both the Soto Mission of Hawaii temple building and the Komagata Hall—albeit costly and lengthy—are necessary. Every effort is being made to keep costs down while utilizing quality materials and workmanship. We humbly ask you for your financial support. Your contributions will be put to good use as we work hard to properly address this problem.

The Soto Mission of Hawaii is currently coordinating a donation drive for the repairs of the temple and the Komagata Hall. In the meantime, please call 808-537-9409 to learn more about how you can help the temple. Mahalo!



2023 Precepts Study with Rev. Jiko Nakade A 3-month series of weekly online Zoom classes from June - August

Two groups (please choose 1):

Group 1: Thursdays from 1:00 -2:00 p.m. Hawaii Time, starting June 1 Group 2: Saturdays from 8:00 - 9:00 a.m. Hawaii Time, starting June 3

In June of 2023, Rev. Jikō will be starting a new series of precepts study sessions using ZOOM. This 3-month course is comprised of weekly one-hour sessions. This is an opportunity to learn about the 16 Bodhisattva precepts, which form the moral and ethical foundation of the Soto Zen tradition.

This is a 3-month period of study and reflection. The sharing of one's life is done in an atmosphere that is gentle, non-judgmental, and compassionate. Many have found their lives illuminated and enriched by this inner journey taken in the context of a loving sangha.

We will be using the book *Being Upright: Zen Meditation and the Bodhisattva Precepts* by Tenshin Zenki Reb Anderson Roshi, a senior Dharma teacher in the Soto Zen tradition of Shunryu Suzuki. "A gifted storyteller, Anderson takes us to the heart of situations, where moral judgments are not easy and we do not have all the answers."



In Remembrance: Bishop Jiho Machida



On March 5, 2023, retired Hawaii Soto Mission Bishop Jiho Machida passed away peacefully at home in Honolulu. He was 96 years of age. He is survived by wife Violet Machida.

Jiho Machida was born on November 3, 1926, in Chichibu, Saitama Prefecture, Japan. At the young age of 26, the then Reverend Jiho Machida left Kokenji temple in Saitama and arrived in Hawaii on November 3, 1952. After serving as resident minister of (the now closed) Waiahole Tomonji Soto Mission, he transferred to the Soto Mission of Hawaii. During his time as a minister at the Soto Mission of Hawaii, Rev. Machida succeeded Mrs. You Komagata as the second principal of the Nuuanu Wakei Gakuen (Japanese Language School), served as the president of the Hawaii Kyoikukai (Japanese School Association), and for a short time served as the Soto Academy principal.

Upon the retirement of Bishop Gyokuei Matsuura on October 31, 1997, Jiho Machida was installed as the 7th bishop of the Hawaii Soto Mission. Bishop Machida was a kind and friendly person. He was also a very smart man, instrumental throughout his career in creating Japanese language textbooks used in many of the Japanese Schools that were operating throughout the state of Hawaii. His also contributed to the Hawaii Soto Mission by creating much of the English Buddhist materials we use to this day. He retired on August 31, 2008, after 56 years of dedicated service to the Hawaii Soto Mission.

Bishop Machida's funeral service will be held at the Soto Mission of Hawaii on Sunday, May 7, 2023, at 3:00 p.m., with visitation to begin at 2:00 p.m. We kindly request that you let your minister know if you plan to attend the service. Please call 808-537-9409 for more information.

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
